### Alumni Spotlight: Neal O. Hammon '48

EDITOR'S NOTE: For this edition of The Illinois Sig, we're shining the spotlight on Brother Neal Hammon '48. From the hometown of Louisville, Kentucky, Neal graduated from UI with a degree in architecture. Now retired after 48 years in the field, he is enjoying working on his farm with his wife of 64 years, Barbara. Together, Neal and Barbara share two sons, Stratton and Scott. Neal served in the Navy for over four years and was in the reserves for over two years. He closed out his career as a JG (lieutenant, junior

grade) and a WW II veteran. Neal has served several years on various historic-home foundation boards within the community, such as the Edison House, the Speed House, and Locust Grove. As an active chapter member, he was the chapter's cartoonist. A certified pilot, he would fly up for games and have lunch at the chapter house. For past fun, he enjoyed flying his Piper and Cessna 182, riding his brother's Harley, and skeet shooting and golf. Today, at 91, Neal enjoys reviewing his photography portfolio, reading, and watching Kentucky basketball.

### What is one of the most memorable moments from your time as an active member?

Living in the house was great. One night, I was hanging out with my roommates, and one of them accidentally flipped a lit cigarette butt into my sock drawer. Being a new member, a dispute broke out about who would retrieve the butt. The phone rang and interrupted the discussion, and the cigarette was forgotten. A fire started that night. Two brothers had to jump out of the third-floor windows and broke some roof tiles on the porch. We always laughed at the imprint they left and how lucky we all had been.

#### When did you get called on for active duty?

I enlisted in the Navy during my sophomore year of college; it was the fall of 1943. After some additional college courses while in the Navy V-12 program, I went to midshipman school at Fort Schiler in New York. Once completed, I was commissioned as an ensign, USNR. From there, I was sent out to the Pacific to the cruiser *USS Montpelier*, CL57, and was in the Philippines and Okinawa, and then in the occupation of Japan after the war ended.



#### How was life on a cruiser ship?

I served as a gunnery officer on the cruiser *Montpelier*; we were the command ship when occupying Hiroshima, and our duty was gunnery support. We discovered that the bomb had not damaged the brewery and that there was plenty of good, inexpensive beer for all the dry American sailors. We enjoyed the occupational duty. It made being on the ship a lot more tolerable during such a stressful time.

### What was it like coming back to Illinois after WW II?

It was very nice seeing old friends on campus again, but there were so many Sigma Chi brothers that we had to open a second house next door to the main chapter house to accommodate everyone. Bidwell's was always a comfort. Significant Sig **Ruck Steger '48** was a friend of mine, but being a vet from WW II, I was recalled for the Korean War, and we

did not see each other much after that. If you like great stories, here is one about Ruck...

Back in 1947, Illinois played and beat UCLA in the Rose Bowl. Ruck was on the first team. When we all got back to school after the Christmas-New Year's break, he

told us fellows who did not get to see the game about something that happened to him. Ruck said that the team had a play where they faked the ball to him, and he started around tackle pretending to be the man carrying the ball. Each time they used that play, it worked out very well, and they were making good yardage, and so they kept using it, and every time they used it, a UCLA linebacker would tackle Ruck. Finally, near the end of the third quarter, the UCLA linebacker tackled Ruck again, and as they were getting up, he looked over at Ruck and said "Ain't you got the ball again?" Ruck and all the Sigma Chi brothers thought that was very hilarious.



### After graduation, how did you stay in touch with your chapter brothers?

I enjoyed dropping by the school to visit the chapter house. In 1949, not long after I had graduated from college and was working as a civilian, I drove up to Illinois to visit some friends after their exams, and on a whim, several of us  $\Sigma$ Xs decided to visit New Orleans for Mardi Gras. One of our Phi Delt friends was with us, but somewhat inebriated, and decided to come along. The next morning, driving thru Memphis, the Phi Delt woke up, and he remembered that he had an exam that day. It was either hitchhike back to school, or continue the trip with us. He chose the latter.

### In your career, what did you enjoy most as an architect?

I enjoyed designing buildings, but in most cases, I was restrained by economic factors. My clients usually wanted a better building than they could afford. The most difficult part of architecture was keeping up with all the government regulations pertaining to the building design. It seemed like every year we had to acquire three or four books because of the new building codes.

### At what point did you embrace the farming life?

I finally took the big step a year after I returned from Korea. I married Barbara Bidwell, who was a Kappa Delta at the University of Kentucky. After the birth of our first child, I bought a house using the GI Bill; as a veteran, we were allowed a low interest rate, so the mortgage payments were very reasonable. After a tornado destroyed one home, and a lightning strike burned down the rebuild, we decided maybe it was time to move out to the country.

#### When did you develop an interest in writing?

All architects must be able to write. On each job, we prepared a book (called architectural specifications) that contains between 120 to 300 pages, depending upon the complexity of the building. I was always interested in history, particularly subjects that others had ignored.

#### Grand Chapter: Report of the Executive Director (excerpt)

June 24, 2017

To the members of the 81st Grand Chapter

The fraternity is now just shy of 335,000 all-time initiated Sigs across 288 chapters, 242 of which are currently active. There are about 16,500 undergraduate Sigs who will return to our chapters this coming fall. There are a few hundred more pledges spread out across our six colonies. We are just north of 250,000 living members of our fraternity. There are almost 60,000 all-time members who have joined the ranks of the Life Loyal Sigs, 40,000 of whom are living. There are about 3,000 men who donate their time to making Sigma Chi better every year and about 6,000 men who donate their treasures to make the work of the Sigma Chi Foundation possible.

But what do we do really well? Alumni involvement and leadership development education.

We are doing incredible things in Sigma Chi. New challenges pop up every day, some we can control and others we can't. I truly believe that the success of Sigma Chi will always hinge on one basic construct: we will only get better when good men (and women) choose to act to make it so.

After Korea, I began writing articles on various subjects of interest and really developed a passion for writing about pioneer history. So far, I have had six books and one CD published and have four others in the cupboard, which I am trying to have published. I think my best book was one I wrote with co-author Richard Taylor, called *Virginia's Western War*, 1775–1786. My Father Daniel Boone is the best seller. Daniel Boone is available digitally. I am currently

working on Following Boone's Trace.

What advice can you give to the alumni and young actives about maintaining a relationship with your chapter brothers?

The experience of being a Sigma Chi Kappa Kappa was one of the most important parts of my life. Looking back, I acquired some of my best friends, and I gained a better understanding about human nature. Sigma Chi is for life.
