What did you enjoy most as an active chapter member?

What I enjoyed most? There was such a sense of camaraderie—which I am grateful for since we live in such a divided nation today—because that kind of brotherhood and friendship has such a strong hold on me, still. During my stay at 410 E. John, there were three important facets to daily life that made a lifelong impression on me: 1.) get good grades; 2.) laugh a lot;

3.) help one another, not necessarily in that order. I had been thrown out of a fraternity (my father's fraternity, Alpha Gamma Rho) after my freshman year at the U. of Illinois). My college—and my life experience—would have been far less interesting and productive had Sigma Chi not taken me in. I laughed a lot.

How do you stay in touch with your brothers today?

I'm embarrassed to say that the way I keep in touch is mostly via the internet and meeting my brethren when I perform in their area. Sigma Chi brothers often come see my live appearances when possible, and I'm always thrilled to reconnect and get updates on their lives.

When did you develop an interest in comedy?

I had a severe knee injury as a football player

for the Fighting Illini varsity in the autumn of my junior year at Illinois. Fortunately, the Sigma Chi House had major "after hours parties" just about every weekend, and on one such Friday night I was asked to deejay (since I couldn't dance—I was in a hip-to-ankle cast). A brother (let's call him "Curly") handed me a microphone. I began making fun of my friends, the college, our football team, etc. As the night went on—and as I became more and more bold in my sarcasm—a student from another fraternity (Alpha Delta Phi) came up to me and asked if I would deejay their party the next week—for money.

And my life changed.

What was your first performance like?

My first performance was an eye-opener at ADPhi the following week because I was getting paid (\$50) and I had to earn my check. It became very obvious, very quickly, I had a lot of work to do. I would need to have at least some kind of routine/content that would either make people laugh or entertain them. I don't think I was very good. But I had a lot of energy (another lesson learned: in live performance, if you're not very good at anything, have a lot of energy—that covers up for lack of skills) so I muddled through and began my career in earnest.

Unfortunately, this 2019-2020 school year is a challenging one for our chapter. During the fall semester, Kappa Kappa was cited for several incidents of misconduct, ranging from alleged hazing, violations of the university's and Interfraternity Council's policy on social event

this semester and PP current pledges. The Kappa Kappa charter was not suspended, nor have there been penalties implemented by the university.

However, Kappa Kappa is definitely under the microscope and must come together to right the ship and revitalize our chapter utilizing Sigma Chi value-based decision-making through the Executive Board. Chapter Advisory Board members serve independently from the Kappa Kappa House Corporation Board and the Sigma Chi International Fraternity, enabling Advisory Board members to provide direct and constructive mentorship. To join, a brother just must be able to:

- Volunteer for at least two years
- Attend regularly scheduled meetings
- Attend Chapter meetings as available
- Assist with Chapter events as needed

We are confident that a strong Advisory Board will have a major impact on the success of Kappa Kappa moving forward. With your participation, we can take a major step in the restoration of Kappa Kappa. Please email Tom Munger '13 at tmunger121@gmail.com to learn about how to get involved.

management, and violation of Sigma Chi's programming implementation requirements. Action plans to eliminate potential hazing opportunities and to ensure policy compliance were unsuccessful.

As a result, Sigma Chi International Fraternity conducted a membership review utilizing a group of non-Kappa Kappa alumni volunteers. The outcome from the review was the placing of 40 members on Suspended-Active-Status (SAS). Today, the chapter has 33 in-house active members and seven out-of-house members enrolled

implementation of positive productive programming. Kappa Kappa's failure here will invite significantly more severe consequences (including potential charter suspension).

On June 29, 2019, Steven J. Thayer '88 accepted a Significant Sig award at the Sigma Chi Grand Chapter in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The Significant Sig award is one of the fraternity's highest honors and recognizes "those alumni members whose achievements in their fields of endeavor have brought honor and prestige to the name of Sigma Chi." The Sigma Chi Fraternity has recognized more than 1,400 brothers since the award's inception at the 1935 Grand Chapter.

In 2013, Steve was named to the Order of Constantine, the fraternity's highest honor for outstanding fraternity service. Approximately 720 brothers have been inducted to the Order of Constantine. Less than 150 brothers have received both a Significant Sig and Order of Constantine Award from the Sigma Chi Fraternity.

Steve dedicated his award to friendship and recognized his lifelong friend and pledge brother, **Jim Skelton '88**. Steve and Jim's sons,

How do you select the topics for your material?


Writing music, comedy, jokes, routines, dialogues, and coming up with creative output is the bane of my existence. Topics for content are unlimited. Making them funny, entertaining and/or informative is the problem. It's a lifelong homework assignment. I hate it.

Which achievements are you most proud of?

I'm proud of both my kids (one graduated summa cum laude from Rutgers and earned a Fulbright, the other is now in grad school at Columbia University) and I'm proud of my marriage of 33 years—to my first wife (so far my only wife).

Professionally, I'm always giving myself a pat on the back when I write a joke that is somewhat contemporary and works. "I live in New

Jersey, so we don't have what you call 'neighbors.' We have 'witnesses." And of course, I'm proud of the accomplishments of my fellow Sigs who have flourished in their personal lives and in the private and public sector during the 40 years since we all graduated from Illinois.

What advice can you give your fellow Sigma Chi brothers about keeping a sense of humor in life?



Going along with whatever the premise is—no matter how inane—at least gives you a chance to elicit some laughter. I think that pertains in a lot



of ways to everyday life. Make the positive choice. There is a fine line between being horrifically perky and realistically critical, of course, but it is obvious to me that lots of inspiration—not just personally but for a lot of artists and creative types I work with—inspiration comes from an expectation that something good is going to happen.

Which lends itself to having a sense of humor—there is always a punchline waiting to be discovered.
