PRESIDENT'S LETTER

"Those Who Commit Will Be Champions in Life"



The title speaks to what is required for organizations to survive and thrive. I am paraphrasing something Bo Schembechler told his team in 1969 when he took over as Michigan's head football coach. The team had lost its rudder. They were soft and not as committed as they

should be to rise as champions. The Vietnam War was raging and protests were happening on every college campus. In those days, athletes went home for the summer, and upon their return, Coach Schembechler expected much from his team. One of the requirements was that upon returning from the summer the lineman had to run a mile in under six mins and everyone else had to run a mile under 5:30. If not, pack your bags.

His message was simple. He told them, "I cannot guarantee success if we commit and work hard, but I can guarantee that if we do not commit and work hard, we will not have success. Those who stay will be champions."

My message: those who commit to our Sigma Chi values and principles—spelled out in all that we do, from learning about our founding fathers and their guiding principles during pledgeship to our initiation ritual—will be champions in life.

I believe we are making tremendous progress with the chapter. Our chapter leadership is responding. We brought in a new chapter advisor, Wes Hanner. He is an '05, lives in town, and was in Mike Church's pledge class (our fraternity's current executive director). Wes is working closely with the chapter alongside Blake

Alumni Spotlight

Timothy O. Schneider is the former chairman of the Illinois Republican Party and a former member of the Cook County Board of Commissioners representing the 15th district. Tim graduated from the University of Illinois with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1977. Schneider serves as general partner and owner of The Golf Club of Illinois in Algonquin and Waterwerks Car Wash in Elgin, Illinois.

Could you please share your story? How did you go from a U of I graduate to the chairman of the Republication Party of Illinois?

When I first graduated, I went back to work at my family business, a nine-hole golf course. I expanded the course to 18 holes and added banquet facilities. During that time, I found out that the Cook County inspectors were asking for bribes to approve inspections. That prompted my interest in politics. Bill Runzel's mother said that there was an opening in the township board. She said, "I'm tired of hearing you speak about politics all the time. Why don't you do something about it?" I interviewed for the board, and they ended up selecting me. I was on that board for about 12 years and then ran for highway commissioner. We found that the previous commissioner was putting fuel in his own gas tank and those of his family members. I vowed to run against him, and I won. Subsequently, I ran for the Cook County Commissioner, and I won a seat at the county board and served there for 12 years. In my personal life, we grew the golf course, bought another one, and bought a car wash. In 2009, we were looking to develop the family golf course. They decided to take it through eminent domain and shut it down. That certainly created a little bit of drama.

In 2014 I met Bruce Rouner, the candidate for governor of the state of Illinois. He knew about me and tapped me on the shoulder and asked me to run for state chairman of the Republican Party. I was selected for the position and served as chairman from 2014 to January 2021. My role as chairman was primarily to deliver the message of the party and get the support of the people in the state. I tried to help the governor as best as I could. I remained a Cook County commissioner at the same time because the chairman position is unpaid.

You've had a long and successful political career. How did you discover your passion for politics?

I really had not thought of getting into the arena until that conversation with Bill's mom. That conversation certainly chartered me on my course to get involved and try to do things to make things better for all people. I was tired of politicians who focused on self-enrichment rather than taking care of the people who they represent.

I always wanted to make my constituents' lives better. Mary Ellen Runzel really chartered my course, and every time I moved up, it was because I felt a need to replace the person because they were not effective.

Cook County has a six-and-a-half billion-dollar budget and 23,000 employees. The county government is bigger than a third of the state governments in the country and dwarves any other county in Illinois. What's the biggest challenge that you've had to overcome in leading Cook County?

What I find and what I've learned is that it's not always the best people who get elected to office. I see so many that can't make the race because of money, influence, and power on the other side. It's frustrating to see that happen in real-time: that many of the best people never get the opportunity to serve because of those reasons. It has taught me how important it is for everyone to understand how much government affects their daily lives. Everything from taxation to the laws that govern our lives is generally controlled by bureaucrats. It's so concerning that good people don't get involved or can't affect change.

What is your proudest accomplishment?

Off the top of my head, I never supported tax increases. I supported cutting the budget because the government was a bloated, employee-rich environment where there are plenty of places to reduce spending instead of raising taxes. A lot of people think that if you want more money, just raise taxes, but that can hurt the local constituents. I fought against that consistently throughout my career.

On a minor scale, I fought red light cameras. I fought for an ordinance. We have over five million people in the county, there are 128 municipalities, and the county wanted to install cameras on each county road. I got an opt-out for any red-light camera for any mayor that didn't want them to go up. It was difficult to push initiatives through when a significant number of people on

the board were Democrats. My district was a funding source, so my job was to show fiscal restraint. It was very difficult to get the opposition on board.

I stopped the soda tax; it was going to add a lot to a 12-pack of soda. I got the media involved and got the outcry of people. The tax was implemented, and we saw instances where people would be at the grocery counter and people would leave their carts there. The net effect was that we were losing money because they just went to the next county over. If this continued, then the grocery stores would be at risk.

I can't tell you how many times I've heard people say to just raise taxes and they won't care, but they do. People do care and they vote with their feet. They will move and go to other places to live.

What impact has Sigma Chi had on your life?

I have two brothers who are Sigma Chis. My twin was initiated about six months before I was, and my other brother was a founding father at Eastern Illinois University. I wasn't interested in joining a fraternity at the beginning; I almost pledged another group. My oldest brother sent a bunch of Sigma Chis over to my dorm and they invited me to come hang out. Thankfully, I hadn't signed another pledge card. I never realized what being a fraternity brother was. I ended up pledging Sig. My two brothers showed up at my initiation, and it was a complete surprise to me.

I drifted away from the fraternity for many years while building my career, raising my kids, and tending to my family; for about 20 years I wasn't that involved. I came to one of the Christmas events (third Thursday in December '76-'79) at which we would go Christmas shopping

with our wives in Chicago. We would never actually go shopping but would meet up and grab dinner or go to a bar, and I seldom have missed that event since so that I can listen to the old stories and gather new stories. It's so cool when someone you haven't seen in many years shows up and we go down memory lane. The friendship is still there, just like it was when we were 19 or 20 years old.
