The Herleman Family

A Kappa Kappa Legacy

William Herleman '42 and Charlie Herleman '81 have a special bond as father and son in the brotherhood of Sigma Chi. In this edition of *The Illinois Sig*, we are shining a spotlight on the Herleman family. William's wife, Terry, and children, Christine, Cynthia, and Charlie, remain dedicated to his memory.

William Herleman attended UI on the GI bill and met his wife, Terry, a UI Kappa Alpha Theta, to whom he was married for 71 years.

A First Lieutenant World War II Veteran serving in the Asian Pacific Theatre in the Philippines as an infantry unit commander in the US Army, he went on to graduate with a degree in business administration and marketing. William spent his professional life in various roles including serving as CEO and President of Wurlitzer and, after retirement, working alongside Charlie for many years as a consultant. He was honored as a Significant Sig in 1973 and was a lifelong advocate for Sigma Chi who embodied the values of the organization he so cherished.

Charlie graduated from UI with a degree in business administration and marketing and earned his MBA at Denver University. He currently owns his own company in Denver where he resides with his wife. He enjoys hosting Sigma Chi brothers who visit and traveling to see his two sons, Tim and Luke. Charlie recalled many fond memories of his father including spending time at family cabins in Wisconsin hosting over 100 guests, fishing and talking on the boat in Key West, celebrating family milestones at Beachcomber Restaurant in Chicago, and the time his father made friends with an Arabian Prince on his flight back from Germany.

Charlie described William as the backbone of his family for him and his two sisters. He described his father as someone who felt the deep meaning of brotherhood during those four treasured years at Kappa Kappa. That Sigma Chi brotherhood bond went with him after graduation. He connected with many brothers over the years from other chapters of Sigma Chi and was always willing to introduce Charlie and help other brothers network as well. William kept in touch with many KK brothers and enjoyed returning to the house to enjoy events such as Homecoming and

reconnecting with alumni and actives alike. He was an honorable and humble man who loved people, his country, his wife, his children, and Sigma Chi.

CHARLIE'S INTERVIEW

How do you stay in touch with your brothers today?

How has your experience as an undergraduate shaped your career post-graduation?

Sigma Chi provided a chance to network post-graduation once in Denver with brothers from other chapters of the national organization. Philanthropy is such a dedicated part of Sigma Chi and being involved on campus instilled a passion for giving back to the community.

What type of work are you doing today?

I own my own company which I started with my son, called Small Office Solutions, an IT support company assisting with database and firewall security.

What advice can you give to alumni and young undergraduate brothers about career growth?

When we are not traveling to see the kids and grandkids, I volunteer with Foresight Adventure Guides for the Blind in Vail, Colorado. We teach the sight impaired to ski during the winter and during the summer, we work with kids at their summer camp to teach them to build confidence and increase self-esteem through activities such as paddle boarding, rock climbing, horseback riding, and more. The most rewarding experience is watching kids accomplish amazing feats and grow.

TERRY'S INTERVIEW

Can you tell me a bit about William?

He grew up on a farm in Quincy, Illinois during the Great Depression. His love for nature stemmed from that. He was an avid fisherman all his life and purchased a fishing camp in Wisconsin. In the summer of 1947, he drove tour buses through the mountains of Glacier National Park in Montana and took the utmost pride in doing so. William had an entrepreneurial spirit that started at the age of eight when his father took him to help sell crops from the farm at the market. He was a hard worker: he started working in retail at 15 selling men's clothing and worked throughout college as well. His motto was "always forward," and he lived his life that way. William would be described as honorable, humble, helpful, faithful, caring, and dedicated in everything he did.

How did you meet William?

While William started college in 1942, he served in WWII and came back after his deployment. I met William at the beginning of the semester in 1946. As a favor to a friend, I was the running stand-in date for one of the brothers, Al Gold, since his fiancé lived out of state. We met for hamburgers at Bidwells to discuss that semester's social agenda for Sigma Chi and William walked in and sat with us for hours catching up with Al since they had not seen each other since before the war. William didn't realize that I wasn't dating Al and when he discovered it the next day, he was at the Theta house by that afternoon calling on me.

William's two daughters, Christine and Cynthia, have always referred to their parent's relationship as a love story. A love story that began in those Kappa Kappa chapter years and lasted 71 years together. Their father embodied morals and integrity, faith, family, country, and helping others.

How did Sigma Chi impact William professionally and personally?

He was totally, enthusiastically, and wholeheartedly a Sigma Chi through and through. William stood by and believed in everything Sigma Chi stood for. He lived and breathed the values and held them as a standard as to which to live his life. Professionally, Sigma Chi was integral in networking. He met some of his most cherished lifelong friends and business partners through the national organization. He loved to help people and was honored to be a member of the organization. He was proud of his affiliation and was never seen without his Sigma Chi ring! He had written a personal mission statement that embodied who he was and how he strived to live his life.

To find fulfillment, meaning, and value in living – I, Bill Herleman will –

LEAD a life centered around the principles of honor, integrity, trustworthiness, patience, humility, and caring about others.

REMEMBER that what's important in life is to have a purpose in life and a sense of accomplishment, own myself, be loving and caring, and ensure the financial security of my family and others; I will also remember the importance of health, sincerity, and maintaining a positive attitude and sense of humor.

REVERE the admirable characteristics in others, such as being enthusiastic, industrious, and principle-centered, and attempt to implement similar characteristics like being proactive, self-reliant, and trustworthy into my own life.

RECOGNIZE my strengths and develop my talents as an articulate person, a philosopher, a counselor, self-disciplined, energetic, hard-working, intelligent, and imaginative.

HUMBLE myself by acknowledging that I can be a procrastinator, tedious, and inflexible, and constantly strive to transform my weaknesses into strengths.

ENVISION myself as always, without fail, to be a person who is courageous, principle-centered, courteous, positive, cheerful, industrious, caring, and a doer.

Clifford (Cliff) Jones'81

November 22, 2023

Cliff Jones was a member of the Kappa Kappa class of '81. Many of you knew Cliff or knew of him. And to many of you, he was known as "Ferd." When he was diagnosed

with cancer in October, over 100 brothers from numerous eras communicated with Cliff in some fashion. That's because he epitomized many of the traits we strive to attain to be a good brother. He was unfailingly supportive of house functions, as well as individual brothers and he was always good-natured.

In his early years, Cliff grew up on a grain farm in the tiny town of Bourbon which is thirty miles south of Champaign. He attended Chaminade College Preparatory in St. Louis for high school where he was an outstanding athlete in football and basketball, a member of many Christian and social action groups, and traveled to England for a special student interaction program.

At Illinois, besides being a member of Sigma Chi, he played on the U of I football team as a kicker. A lasting memory for his brothers was that immediately before each kick-off, he always held up a special hand signal for their benefit. Cliff was one of the last of the straight-on kickers. He wore a square toe, kangaroo skin, tied-up kicking shoe which can be seen in the picture below right. In those days a tomahawk sticker was awarded to him for each touchback achieved by his kicks out of the end-zone. His helmet was covered in stickers. He was also the assistant rush chairman, assistant social chairman, and assistant magister at Sigma Chi. Further, he was an assistant manager at the renowned campus bar, Kams.

He remained in the Champaign area where he was involved in the farming industry in several capacities for almost 40 years. He was an avid Illini fan, staying at all times up to date on Illini news and attending 100s of events over his lifetime. And being very

social, he will always be remembered for hosting numerous parties and cook-outs for his friends and Sigma Chi brothers. During his college years, he hosted the memorable "Jones Jam," named after Willie Nelson's "Farm Jam" of the time. It took place for several years at the family farm in Bourbon where hundreds of pork chops were served.

He was involved in an eclectic mix of activities: he served on the board of the U of I Varsity I Association, he was a

member of the Knights of Columbus, he was a woodworking hobbyist, he owned a boar named "Butkus" that was used for breeding, he liked to travel and he set foot in almost every state in the continental U.S., he worked in several roles at St. Vincent de Paul catholic church, and he was a youth coach at the Champaign Park District. In addition, he attended almost all the events for his daughter and son at St. Matthew Catholic School and The High School of St. Thomas More. As Brother Dave Hoffman '80 whimsically stated after reading his obituary, "Cliff wasn't only a great guy; he was a Renaissance man."

In his final month and after his death numerous stories surfaced that remembered Cliff as being positive, enthusiastic, and always with a smile on his face.

Pledge son Robb Sackett '83 recalls that "Cliff was always supportive and uplifting and would repeat the same quote on numerous occasions: 'What are you going to do?' In other words, whenever bad things were happening that were outside of your control, keep moving forward and you'll be able to work things out."

Kevin Young '82 remembered, "One of the earliest memories I have of Cliff was at halftime of a football game when Ferd's then-girlfriend who was an Illinette and I brought food down to the sideline for him. He came over to us and acted like we had just done the cleverest and nicest thing in the world. It was the middle of a Big Ten football game, and he was thanking me many times for doing that (though he was no doubt mortified and may have thrown it in the trash because of possible player rules)."

Casey Welch '84 shared: "I'll always remember a gloomy late February afternoon when I was a pledge

heading back to the house from class. Walking by Kams I saw Cliff, who I barely knew. He was heading into Kams to work, and he invited me to come in. We talked off and on for over an hour and he was sincerely interested in everything I had learned about the house to date and he gave me all kinds of constructive advice regarding pledgeship. From that point on I never hesitated to seek his advice and I made a lifelong friend."

Frank Simonetti '83 recalled that at informal rush, "Ferd was the first Sig I met. I was early, so Ferd came up to me, introduced himself, and took me to lunch. He didn't have to do that. He then introduced me to several Illini cheerleaders and football players. He was such a stud to me as a high school senior and still is a stud to me today."

There were countless other stories that brothers recalled. Many of us will remember our own. Those of us who were lucky enough to know him will always remember Cliff. Cliff was the son of the late Bill Jones '53, the brother to Chip Jones '83, and an uncle to Daniel Gartrell, HΩ'18.
